Tenshozan Renge-in Komyoji-Temple

Explanation of **Tourist Attraction** It has been passed along that Tenshozan Renge-in Komyoji-Temple, which is the Jodo-shu Daihonzan, was built by Nen'a Ryochu Shonin, the third patriarch of Jodo-shu, in the year 1243. In the Edo Period, Tokugawa Ieyasu-ko (Lord Ieyasu) made this temple the head of the Kanto Juhachi Danrin (school). Furthermore, the current temple gate built in the year 1847 holds the best rank among the temples in Kamakura and solemnly welcomes worshippers.

selling point

It conducts services such as monk-quided prayer offerings, sermons, sutra copying experiences, and a special viewing of the temple gate balcony for groups of 20 or more people. Further, for lunch only, you can enjoy Buddhist vegetarian food (reservation required).
